In 37 years of serving the region, we have kept over 134,000 children and babies safe from abuse and neglect. Over 99% of all children involved with the Crisis Nursery remain safely with their families with no substantiated reports of abuse or neglect and free from foster care placement. Additionally, every service the Crisis Nursery's clinically-trained, trauma-informed staff offers is both free and voluntary, built on trust and respect for what caregivers are going through.



As you review our FY 2023 Report, you will see that the future is bright—but only if we find the will to keep investing in preventing childhood trauma, supporting families and helping them stay together, and building stronger, more vibrant communities at the grassroots level where no child is punished for being born into poverty.

- Short-term care for young children in a safe and nurturing environment
- **Empowering families** to resolve crises and build resiliency through culturally responsive interventions
- Equitable access to concrete support, crisis counseling, and parenting education
- Grassroots community outreach and training to build child abuse prevention awareness
- Advocacy for the safety and wellbeing of all children and families in our region



Family Empowerment Program

11 Empowerment Centers provide individualized trauma-informed interventions to help families move beyond crisis into stability, including Case Management, Parenting Groups, Emergency Funding, and Crisis Mental Health Counseling.

Jamie's finances took a hit when all three of her children were sick with fevers last month, and she was forced to take time off from her hourly job. She tried her best to keep up with her expenses, but still fell behind on her electric bill. The forecast showed a heat wave approaching, and Jamie's electricity had just been shut off. Jamie started to panic about the safety of her children. She didn't know who to turn to for help. Then, she remembered she could call the Saint Louis Crisis Nursery.

While her children enjoyed a happy and cool few days in the safety of the Nursery, Jamie met with a Family Empowerment Counselor, who was able to secure Crisis Nursery Emergency Funds to get her electricity reconnected.

When families have nowhere else to turn, the Crisis Nursery is here!

Latinx Outreach Program

540 Latinx Families received trauma-informed interventions to increase stability

Empowering families through culturally responsive programming entirely in Spanish

1,295 Crisis Intervention & Family Stabilization sessions

98% gained new Protective Factors

116 were newly arrived families from Central and South America, with the majority from Columbia

100% were able to get preventative medical care for their children

95% experienced reduced stress levels

100% Of clients receiving longer-term case management services reported an increased comfort level in advocating for their family's needs

14 Latinx Parent Education Groups engaged 245 Parents

Responding to the Need

The Need: 1 in 6 children in the Greater St. Louis area lives without consistent access to food.

The Response: • 2,300 Emergency Food Bags were provided to Families

• 50,000 meals and infant feedings were provided to Nursery Children

The Need: 35 children a day are reported as abused or neglected in the Greater St. Louis region.

The Response:

- 198,000 hours of Crisis Care were provided in FY 2023 a 25% increase
- 99% of children provided Crisis Care did not have a child abuse/neglect report or an out-of-home placement











Art & Play Therapy in the Community:

In response to a growing need in St. Charles County for trauma-informed mental health services for children, the Crisis Nursery expanded Art & Play Therapy services into the community at four Day Care Centers.

- 42 children received Therapy sessions
- 308 therapy sessions were provided with children at the Day Care Centers
- 29 early childhood professionals were provided training on Art & Play Trauma-Informed Therapy interventions

Independent Study shows Crisis Nursery PREVENTION Programs WORK!

In FY23 the SLCN was proud to partner with St. Louis University for an outside evaluation of our Respite program's impact on parents' stress levels. Results showed that participation in respite care significantly reduced parental stress not only related to parenting, but across 19 different domains that included housing, safety, employment, and other relationships!

Using Saint Louis Crisis Nursery respite care during times of crisis has a positive ripple effect across their lives!



Crisis Nursery Impact Stories

Bri stared at the empty cupboard, feeling paralyzed. After paying her rent this month, she had barely any money left over for food. With another week before her next paycheck. Bri had no idea how she would feed her three children until then. As she stewed over her options, Bri remembered the Crisis Nursery. She called immediately and explained her concerns to the Nursery staff, who met her worry with empathy and a plan! Later that day, Bri headed to the Nursery to receive food bags for her family and a list of nearby food pantries. She was grateful to know her children would be safe and fed.





Jessica was having thoughts that scared her. She had been on medication for depression before but stopped when she became pregnant. Now, Jessica was trying her best to care for herself, her 3-week-old, and her toddler, but for the past few days, she could not stop crying and she couldn't stop thinking about harming herself. She called a Helpline that advised her to go to the Hospital ER, but Jessica didn't have a safe place to take her children. Then she remembered the Saint Louis Crisis Nursery, and with the Helpline Social Worker, Jessica called the Nursery. Today, her children are safe and happy at the Nursery, while Jessica receives the support she needs for her family to thrive!

Alexis had just given birth to her second child. She was sitting alone in the hospital with her newborn, Mariah, when her Family Empowerment Counselor walked in with a large basket of gifts. The FEP counselor sat with Alexis and listened as Alexis shared Mariah's birth story, cried that no one had come to visit her, and shared her fears about post-partum depression, which Alexis experienced in the past. Alexis counselor was the first and only person to visit her in the hospital. After their visit, Alexis felt confident that she could handle the difficult job of raising children on her own. No matter how difficult parenting might be, Alexis knew she was not alone. She had the support of the Crisis Nursery.


